

There is a sincere sense of pride associated with writing this report. That sense of pride stems from the fact that Carbon Power and Light Inc., your Rural Electric Cooperative is celebrating its 83rd Year of successfully providing distribution electric service to our Member-Owners. So...what is the "Cooperative" difference? Carbon Power and Light Inc., along with all other Rural Electric Cooperatives across the nation, adhere to seven guiding principles:

- Voluntary and Open Membership: Cooperatives are voluntary organizations, open to all persons able to use their services and willing to accept the responsibilities of membership, without gender, social, racial, political or religious discrimination.
- Democratic Member-Owner Control: Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their Member-Owners, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. The elected Board of Directors is accountable to the membership. Cooperative Member-Owners have equal voting rights (one Member-Owner, one vote).

- Member-Owner Economic Participation: Member-Owners contribute equitably to and democratically control the capital of their Cooperative.
- Autonomy and Independence: Cooperatives are autonomous, self-help organizations controlled by their Member-Owners. If they enter into agreements with other organizations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure the democratic control by their Member-Owners and maintain their Cooperative autonomy.
- Education, Training and Information: Cooperatives provide education and training for their Member-Owners, elected Directors, Managers and Employees so that they can contribute effectively to the development of the Cooperative.
- Cooperation among Cooperatives: Cooperatives serve their Member-Owners most effectively and strengthen the Cooperative movement by working together through local, national, regional and international structures.
- Concern for Community: While focusing on Member-Owner needs, Cooperatives work for the sustainable development of their communities through policies accepted by the Member-Owners.

One of the key elements vital to achieving the Cooperative's ties to its Member-Owners and its ability to adhere to the aforementioned principles is our monthly Cooperative newsletter called "Carbon Light Lines". During this past year, this newsletter has included articles informing you about the progress of:

• Our additions to our team and our long time employee that have met their goal of retirement.

- Tri-State our Cooperative power supplier and the challenges they face in maintaining reliable affordable power.
- We informed you about our possible consolidation that your Cooperative is analyzing to improve Member-Owner service and cost savings.
- The Cooperative newsletter and the statewide publication "The WREN Magazine" also provided you information specific to state, regional and national issues impacting the Cooperative's operation, such as the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) efforts to use their regulatory authority to regulate carbon dioxide (CO2).

Call to order:

Director Shae Johnson called the 82nd annual meeting of the membership to order at 12:30 P.M. on June 24, 2023 at the Platte Valley Community Center located in Saratoga, WY. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by those in attendance followed by a moment of silence for those we have lost, then the invocation was given by President Jim Rogers.

Reading of the Official Notice Attorney Hank Bailey read the Official Notice of the 82nd Annual Meeting printed in the May edition of the cooperative's newsletter in the WREN magazine.

Official Notice of Quorum:

Attorney Hank Bailey reported that a quorum was present with registered Member-Owners.

2023 Minutes:

Attorney Hank Bailey asked for a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes from the 2023 Annual Meeting of the Membership. A Member-Owner from the floor motioned to approve the minutes. The motion was seconded and approved without dissent.

Joint Report by President Jim Rogers and General Manager Russell Waldner: President Rogers and Mr. Waldner

reported their written report was in the WREN and reminded everyone that Carbon has not had any rate increases since 2017. Mr. Parrie completed a slide show that entailed pictures of Carbon's new substations. Mr. Waldner inquired if there were any quesitons from the floor. None were asked.

Treasurers Report:

Treasurer Debbie Reichert reported on the taxes paid by Carbon in 2022. Mrs. Reichert reported the annual audit would be taking place in July by Blodgett, Mickelsen & Adamson P.S. and that last year's audit results concluded no issues.

Student Scholarships:

Scholarship certificates were presented to the 2021-2022 scholarship recipients. Carbon's recipients were Allison Bromley, Cora Schroeder, Peyton Munroe, Whitney Bennett, Mia Codallos and Iylie Mae Hobbs. Tri-State recipents were Rowdy Alameda and Hannah Lee. Basin recipient was Gabi Johnson.

Service Awards:

President Jim Rogers and Mr. Waldner presented certificate of service to the employees; Mr. Jim McKinney for 20 years, Mr. Josh Saier for 15 years and Mr. Corry Juhnke for 5 years. Mr. Waldner presented the certificate of service

Tri-State Report:

Carbon's Board representative for Tri-State for 2021, Director Clay Thompson, reviewed Tri-State's operations over that year. Director Thompson engaged the crowd into telling him what the most important item to them was. Affordability, Reliability, Flexibility and Responsibility. Reliability won easily.

Director Thompson introduced the Chief Energy Innovations Officer for Tri-State, Mr. Reg Rudolph. Mr. Rudolph stated he would do his best to keep reliable and affordable energy for Carbon's members.

WREA report Director Kenny Curry introduced Executive Director for WREA Shawn Taylor. He reported on Lineman's Appreciation Day with the Governor Gordon. He talked about the Lineman Scholarship the WREA gives away annually. The Youth Tour that just got back from Washington DC. He then reported on the last legislations sessions that had impact on the Cooperatives.

Election Results:

Attorney Hank Bailey reported that the Nominating Committees met in April to review the bylaws as they pertained to the process of

nominating and electing Board Members. The Directors in District 1 and 2 are running unopposed for their respective District seats. They will continue to represent District 1 and 2.

District 1 Roger Cox for a 3 year term and District 2 -Incumbent Everett Summers from Rock River for a 3-year term. Director Election results for District 3 are Incumbent Clay Thompson was elected for a 3 year term.

Unfinished Business: There was no unfinished business.

New Business:



Carbon Power & Light is a non-profit, memberowned, member-served electric utility cooperative serving approximately 4,400 Member-Owners with 26 full time employees. Approximately 6,676 meters cover a span of 4,500 square miles with an average of 3.3 meters per mile of power line in Albany and Carbon Counties.
